The suggestion to move Books & Rummage sale down to the breezeway was a stroke of genius, thanks to Joni. All day, fairgoers visited the Meeting house, some sitting for periods of time, some getting a review of our principles from Laura. Several suggested they would like to come to experience worship. This was community-building at its best. Community-building among our members and attenders was evident from the enthusiasm they showed in their interactions. Participation in the preparation and on the day was higher than any other fair so far.

The day started with five grown men flailing sections of tent poles in the air and finally finding the right connections. Tents went up with bright tops inviting the neighbors to investigate. In fact, one tent literally went up off the ground in a strong gust of wind, nearly missing a neighbor getting her face painted by Elizabeth. Caught in mid-air, it did no damage and was securely anchored to a tree branch.

With George at the helm and a tireless crew, baked goods flew off the table and by 2:00, not one mini-muffin could be found, not one cookie. The ample and quality items in the rummage sale drew hopeful bargain hunters, who were not disappointed. The loaded book tables drew a steady stream of browsers who were greeted with information and conversation.

Suzanne led delighted children on ponies down the hill to the dry creek, through our "woods," and showed them where the children's room and worship room are. Katherine, Josh, Jillian and Annabelle helped with the children's activities, including lobbing bean bags at a lovely forest scene Mimi painted on a 4-foot panel. Ben introduced his daughters to the children's room treasures 'til they became more comfortable with our campus.

The most colorful booth award goes to Peggy for her artful flower arrangements. The single most profitable goes to Ken, whose collection of Malaysian and East Asian carvings drew a collector: We suspect we'll see them again on E-Bay. The litter of black & white, and tan puppies were hugged and cuddled. We hope some parents signed up for more information about adoption.

Next to the puppies was an array of toys for dogs & cats, and next to that, toys for girls and boys. This was a new booth this year, and did well. Parents bought toys that the children were drawn to, and emptied the pockets of delighted parents.

At one point Stephen took a group of six on a tour of our facilities.

The joyful mood and outcome can be traced to the teamwork that developed both before and during the day. In the end, we were exhausted and exhilarated in equal measure. Is the effort worth the rewards? In monetary terms, probably not. But in joy and comradeship? definitely. "Next year we can..."

in the city street


in the alleys you might find me by the side of a drunken man.
