May all beings be free from suffering and the causes of suffering.


May all beings rejoice in the well-being of others.


May all beings live in peace, free from greed and hatred.

### Report from Representative Meeting, held 23 January

#### 2021 annual sessions of South Central Yearly Meeting

Representative Meeting approved the program for the 2021 Yearly Meeting. The theme, continued from last year, is **Loving in the Light: Quaker Engagement in Times of Crisis, Part II**. There will be workshops, panel discussions, Home Groups (small groups for worship sharing), breakout rooms for interest groups and small group chit-chat, as well as the beloved Meeting for Business. There'll even be worship!

The keynote speaker is Eileen Flanagan, a Quaker and nationally known activist and spiritual writer. One of her books, *The Wisdom to Know the Difference*, was praised by one at RM and, per her website, the Dalai Lama. Besides the Keynote Speech, she will participate at other times.

Because many comments after 2020 SCYM were about "Zoom fatigue", the Planning Committee spread events from Sunday, 28 March to Sunday, 4 April (Easter), with Monday through Thursday events just 1 ½ hours in the evening. # Food for Thought

### The Virtue of Curiosity

When I was a child, the most memorable axiom that I heard about curiosity was: "Curiosity killed the cat." What an egregious thing to tell a kid. Sadly, curiosity is rarely encouraged in many churches, families, and organizations. In fact, it is often discouraged. Instead, certainty is promoted, celebrated, and frankly, demanded. Mid-way through my fifties, I find myself grieving, because I have fallen victim to our culture's attitude towards crushing curiosity.

When I was growing up, my family attended a Caucasian Southern Baptist Church. I went to a Christian school. My gullibility to believe exactly as I was told was encouraged and a quest for knowledge through questioning and curiosity was discouraged, especially in the areas of faith and science. Theologian Fr. Richard Rohr has a great quote about science and faith that speaks to the importance of curiosity. He says: "My scientist friends have come up with things like 'principles of uncertainty' and dark holes. They're willing to live inside imagined hypotheses and theories. But many religious folks insist on answers that are always true. We love closure, resolution and clarity, while thinking that we are people of 'faith'!" Churches often push for certainty in personal spiritual belief and discourage curiosity.

Our lack of curiosity is a huge hindrance in relationships. In fact, most arguments, hurt feelings, and fractures in relationships and organizations stem from a deplorable lack of curiosity. Our egos like to make decisions about the intentions of others. Our egos thrive on taking offense. Our ego deceives us to believe that our victimhood is our virtue. We don't want to be wrong about such opinions or decisions, therefore we bypass curiosity about the words and behaviors of others and go straight to condemnation and disconnection. Perhaps, that is one of the reasons Jesus said "So if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go. First be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift." - Matthew 5:23-24

I firmly believe reconciliation requires curiosity, not certainty. However, it is hard. It is humbling. It is scary. It often subjects you to words you may not want to hear. Our ego, pride, flesh, sin nature (whatever you want to call it) resists curiosity, because it is uncomfortable.



Curiosity is brave. My heroine Brené Brown says "Curiosity is an act of vulnerability and courage. We need to be brave enough to want to know more." I find this to be true. As I have grown in my faith, I am less certain, and more curious. It's not for the faint of heart, as having no certainty can be scary. Brené also says curiosity is a "shit-starter," and I believe her!

While I have found peace with not having certainty in my beliefs about God or the church. I am grieved to see that certainty of belief is celebrated and often with it comes hate and misunderstanding about the "other" (other religions, other races, other cultures).

By crushing curiosity, it means we tend to dismiss or push away the other. The riots, the protests, the anger that is erupting in our world today are "Exhibit A" to my whole premise here that we all need to be more curious. We need to be curious about the experiences of those who are angry about racial/social injustice and how they have personally been affected. Why are people leaving the church tradition in which they were raised? Why are our friends changing political affiliation? Why are our spouses so withdrawn? Why are we resistant to listening to the stories, values, and virtues of those that identify as LBGTQ+? Why does our adult child not want to come visit? Why is a friend suddenly avoiding you? We can and should be so much more connected and understanding of each other. Curiosity is the key to increasing connection and understanding. Leaning into curiosity is the way forward. We need to have curiosity about others, ourselves, and our faith.

I believe if we engage with curiosity, we will begin to feel empathy for others. Empathy and curiosity breed connection. If we are not curious about our fellow humans, how can we be empathetic? We are much more comfortable defending our delusions than confronting them with information. We would rather be offended because it makes us both the hero and the victim of the stories we are telling ourselves. We would rather reject the other, than confront our preconditioned, pre-existing biases and prejudices. We would rather gather around our own than to allow the presence of those that may breach our gated kingdoms.

The applicability of this information to families, marriages, politics, friendships, churches, and businesses is profound. Truly, we can all benefit by practicing curiosity. I urge you to be that person who nurtures curiosity. Be that person that fuels curiosity and encourages asking questions, creativity, learning, and discovery. Be the person that asks questions instead of defaulting to only having answers. Be that person who seeks to understand before being understood.

Just remember: A B C - Always Be Curious!
