On COVID and Meeting for Worship

The COVID-19 Delta variant is still active in our community, so San Antonio Quakers have paused our in-person Meetings for Worship until at least mid-September. Even vaccinated people can catch and transmit this variant. We wish to protect immunocompromised people, children, and others who are unable to be vaccinated. We are being especially cautious because of the state government's opposition to needed public health measures.

We do not know how long our Zoom-only sojourn will last. Please make sure you are on our Announcements list so we can inform you when inperson and blended Meetings for Worship, forums, and other indoor activities resume. "There is so much to say about abolition in all its forms, and I'm also deeply aware that many Friends are not in unity about what abolition feels like or means or does. But it feels equally important to push the conversation into the realm of dreaming as a way of creating connection to our dreamed-for future and between our current, very human communities.

Nigerian trans-public thinker and philosopher Bayo Akomolafe invites us to consider the beauty first: "What kind of raw and beautiful world lies beyond the fences and walls that confine not just our bodies, but also our imagination, our speech, our very humanity?"

Abolition is not just about doing away with prisons or border walls or detention centers. It is also stripping away the fences and walls we have built inside our hearts that allow us to use punitive behaviors on ourselves and inside our own hearts. Dear Friend, you deserve the freedom in your heart that you desire for the world!" *From August 26*.

"You ever feel just...overwhelmed by everything? Kinda like a wave is about to crash on the beach where you are a little crab, just trying to do your little crab things?

FCNL Action Information

In March, the House passed the **George Floyd Justice in Policing Act** (H.R.1280). Now, lawmakers in the Senate are negotiating a package that both sides can agree on.

We need to ensure that these negotiations produce a strong Senate-version of the Justice in Policing Act—one that would ban chokeholds and no-knock warrants, limit the transfer of military grade equipment to state and local law enforcement, raise the use of force standard, and reform qualified immunity. It is imperative that Congress keep these reforms in the bill.

Lobby to Save our Climate

I noted in the San Antonio newspaper this Friday morning, 27 August, two articles: "Earth's health at worst levels on record", about NOAA's "State of the Climate in 2020" report, just released, and "Shifting winds prompt new alerts as fires rage on", mostly about the wildfires in California (over 1414 sq. miles in just 3 of 14 large fires as of today), plus 34 sq. miles in Minnesota's nearly pristine Boundary Waters Canoe Area. None of these are more than 50% contained – mostly far less. Climate change is, now and increasingly, degrading our quality of life (not just human life). What to do? Here are two options.

OPTION ONE:

Citizens' Climate Lobby has a quick and easy way to lobby your U.S. Representative. Simply log on to http://citizensclimatelobby.org/house/. On the right side, in a green box, click on "Email and Call My Representative". Enter your address so that you're connected to YOUR Representative – you don't have to know! Personalize slightly (or to taste) the prepared text and click send. That will lead you to calling, with script, which you can/should personalize. (The staffer isn't able to have a long conversation. Keep it to the point.) You're done in less than 5 minutes! Don't know enough about the ask, carbon tax and dividend? The CCL website has loads of easy-to-understand information. No, you don't have to be a member/participant in CCL. Everyone is welcome to this effort.

OPTION TWO:


FCNL's http://fcnl.quorum.us/campaign/34603/?utm_source=fcnlaction functions similarly to CCL's link. It is for both Senators and your Representative and has a wider scope than just carbon fee (or tax) and dividend. Of course, there's lots of background information elsewhere on fcnl.org should you want more.

In yesterday's (26 August) Thursdays with Friends webcast (fcnl.org/thursdayswithfriends), the guest speaker noted that the rule-of-thumb in Congress is that one call from a constituent represents 200-300 similarly-minded constituents. Speak up for those silent folks.

Texas Coalition Against the Death Penalty

Scheduled Executions in September

John Ramirez: September 8, 2021

Although COVID cases are once again surging across the country, the State of Texas appears determined to move forward with seven scheduled executions over the next three months. On September 8, 2021, the State is scheduled to execute John Ramirez. It is the third execution date he has faced in recent years. Ramirez was convicted in 2009 of killing and robbing Pablo Castro in Corpus Christi in 2004. He was 20 years old at the time of the offense.

Ramirez has requested his spiritual advisor, Pastor Dana Moore of Second Baptist Church in Corpus Christi, accompany him in the execution chamber. He also asked that Pastor Moore be allowed to lay hands upon him and pray aloud at his moment of death in accordance with his religious practice. After these requests were denied, Ramirez filed a federal complaint alleging the violation of the free exercise of his religious beliefs. The complaint remains pending.

Take action now!

Ramirez has filed an application for clemency with the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles in which he requests a commutation of his sentence to life imprisonment, a 90-day reprieve from execution, and a hearing.

We need all concerned Texans to email the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles to urge the members to recommend clemency and a reprieve for John Ramirez

(you must include his TDCJ #999544 and DOB 06/29/1984 in your appeals).

Rick Rhoades: September 28, 2021

The State of Texas is scheduled to execute Rick Rhoades on September 28, 2021. He was convicted in Harris County in 1992 and has spent nearly 30 years on death row. We will provide more information about his case soon.

To date in 2021, the State of Texas has put two people to death: Quintin Jones and John Hummel.

Only Texas and the federal government have carried out executions this year. Texas also is the only state with multiple executions scheduled at this time, although the Attorney General of Oklahoma recently asked the Oklahoma Court of Criminal Appeals to set execution dates for seven individuals, starting with John Grant on October 7, 2021 and Julius Jones on October 28, 2021. A petition for Jones, who steadfastly maintains his innocence, has secured more than 6 million signatures.
