Worship:

The spirit was strong in people's attempts to keep meeting alive. Zoom made possible a vital connection to meeting and the wider world for me. Being able to go to meeting via zoom in a period of extreme isolation, on top of a move to a place where we have not found a Friends Meeting, was a lifesaver. The silent retreat and worship in the community room have held us together.

Meeting community:

Connecting with far flung friends is considerably significant. The care of the meetinghouse and the care to keep things growing reflects a commitment to developing our own spiritual lives/worship experience There was resistance to hybrid meetings and zoom but Friends adjusted to the changes. Even though the tech impinges on the worship, over all it is a boon.

Religious Education:

Memorial Meeting for Mark Hickman, February 5, 10:00

Mark Lee Hickman, 77, passed away on Tuesday, November 23, 2021 in San Antonio, Texas. He was born to proud parents C. Addison and Dorothy Hickman on November 10, 1944 in Sioux City, Iowa. Family was very important to Mark. His brother Paul remembers twin paper routes with Mark, and family contests of scrabble and bridge. Paul and his sister Mary also remember family vacations in the summer, to many parts of the country. Mark always kept in touch with family members, including his cousins and his nephews and niece.

San Antonio became Mark's home throughout his adult life. He did regular volunteer work at that food pantry and also worked at the San Antonio Zoo as a guide at the butterfly exhibit, explaining about the kinds of and the lives of butterflies. He also loved learning, and was a tutor at the San Antonio Community College and spent much time at the public library. He was one of the first members of the local Quaker Meeting and followed their progress from gathering in a local doctor's office to the building of their own Meetinghouse. Mark would ride his bike to Meeting despite the distance involved or even the weather, and was particularly fond of riding through his old neighborhood in the Monte Vista and Tobin Hill area. He loved nature, and also frequently took long walks. He loved the trees and the animals he met along his walks. He loved watching the changing of the seasons.

These stories all reflect on the fact that Mark was a true poet. He wrote constantly and would share his poems with family and friends, usually written in pencil and torn from a page in his notebook. He loved attending poetry readings, both as a reader and a listener. He finally had a collection printed and bound, titled "Spirit, Please Come Stay" which many of us cherish. His poems could be simple and direct, like a haiku, and would reflect his love for being in nature:

cypress points to starry winter sky. I walk.

Or, as those who knew Mark will recognize, they could reflect the pain he often felt:

God feels far away. I walk twilight streets and cannot feel. Beauty sings not so strong as lonely.

Though often there is a triumphant theme, even if found in a dark place:

Jesus arose on a foggy night. Fear danced where I lay bound. His light held my mind. My fear had no name and its long hair wound through my brain. Laughter roared: I am not the one to arise and make such claims.

Jesus lay bound in my deepest tombs and a white song sang my name I knew no peace but my terror ceased and I wept where he had lain.

Children's Program: Up and Running [literally]

The children made their own banner, "We Have a Dream." We introduced the idea of Integrity, the Quaker Testimony for the month.

February is Black History Month, leading off with George Washington Carver and his experiments with peanuts as an alternative to growing cotton, Children will make peanut butter soup for the Meeting. Friends can show their support for the children's program by

attending in person and having a bowl of soup on Feb. 6. Equality will be the Testimony of the month.



Friends Consider the Problems of Burn Out

Queries about Burnout

A small group of Friends met on Jan. 24th in a worship-sharing process to consider how they and our community experience burnout. The topic and experience have been brought up frequently at Ministry, Care, and Guidance meetings and also arise in our daily life perhaps especially exacerbated by the additional pressures we are experiencing from the Covid pandemic. Worship-sharing responses are confidential, but it seemed to me that each of the attenders at this session has (and some of us now are) experienced burnout. Understatement alert! Probably we aren't the only ones. We considered the following queries:

How has burnout affected our spiritual lives? What can we do to avoid or respond to burnout? How does burnout affect our community?

I found that reflecting on these queries gave me more insight on my own experience and reactions to my burnout, and invite Friends to consider them if they seem useful. The 7th Annual Quaker Fair? Saturday, May 7?

The Quaker Fair was becoming an expected event when Covid hit and we pulled back. Then we took a chance in 2021 and held a scaled back affair. Tents went up. Baked goods donated by stores lined the tables. Neighbors came out to greet us.

We are considering the possibility for this year. Is the Fair worth the effort? Will Friends step up to fill the essential jobs? 1) Coordinator: keep track of what needs to be done and who has volunteered to do it. 2) Publicity: contact the list 2 to 3 weeks in advance. 3) Street Sign Monitor: collect past signs, up date them, make new ones; one week prior, get volunteers to post them and keep a list so they can be collected. Other jobs are needed on the day.

The Fair is a wonderful community builder within the Meeting, and outreach into the greater community. Think about it. Can we rise to the occasion of the 7th Annual Quaker Fair?

<u>February 13: Forum / Discussion on Friends Committee on National</u> <u>Legislation, led by Julia Hitz</u>

Every two years, Friends Committee on National Legislation asks Friends and their meetings, churches, and other groups all over the country to discern **which public policy issues they feel are most pressing for the next Congress**. These groups highlight <u>legislative priorities</u> from the many topics and questions identified in FCNL's Policy Statement, "<u>The World We Seek</u>."

The overall structure of the Policy Statement includes the following facets: Part I: We seek a world free of war and the threat of war. Part II: We seek a society with equity and justice for all. Part III: We seek a community where every person's potential may be fulfilled. Part IV: We seek an earth restored.

During the forum, the San Antonio Friends Meeting will discuss specific legislative actions that could be taken under this framework, and prioritize the issues to be submitted to FCNL.

FCNL Letter Writing

The United States is complicit in the Saudi-led coalition's war and blockade in Yemen, which has created the worst humanitarian crisis in the world today. After seven years of

war, roughly 16 million Yemenis are at risk of famine, and over two million children under the age of five are severely malnourished.

The United States remains complicit through continued intelligence sharing on airstrikes and by enforcing the air and sea blockade of Yemen—despite President Biden's promise in early 2021 to end U.S. support for the Saudi-led coalition. This month, we ask you to urge your members of Congress to reintroduce and pass a Yemen War Powers Resolution!

Over the last few years, bipartisan majorities in both chambers of Congress have supported ending U.S. support for this war. Act now: Urge your members of Congress to introduce and pass a Yemen War Powers Resolution to end U.S. participation in the Saudi-led war on Yemen. We take our excellent newsletter for granted. We use technology and have made use of technology that was in place

I am grateful for the Christmas Eve worship and meal; even though attendance dwindled, the experience was enriching.

Concerns that have not been adequately explored:

Participation in work days has gone down but is steady. Even though people had reduced means, our contributions met our (reduced from previous years) budget. The sense of community is not diminished.

We continue to be concerned about burnout.

There are two worship tracks, zoom and in person; there is concern that these not become silos.

Grateful for Friends' concerns during a Friend's recovery.

Concerned about the country's slide into fascism, voting rights, the Big Lie.

A discrete camera and notso-discrete video screen will enhance the experience and let everyone in both modes to participate fully.

The equipment is on order and will be installed soon. We are moving into the 21st century.
