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What FMSA Needs To Do, and How To Do It

Friends Meetings have no paid staff; we depend on volunteers to do the tasks that keep Meetings running and to provide the collective discernment of the right path forward. To do this, we have traditionally relied on formal committees. Recently, this has not worked well. September 11 Forum focused on the following:

- Identifying the things to which we must attend, no matter what size meeting and how many resources we have, and
- Noting which of these our current structure fails to address adequately.


We divided the things we need to address into four groups: *Spiritual, Pastoral, Physical, and Other*. These are areas, not solutions. (E.g.: *we might deepen group spiritual life through formal retreats, through forums, or in another way.*) See page 4 for the breakdown.

September 25 Forum focused on:

- Confirming and adjusting the lists, and
- Brainstorming creative ways to reorganize ourselves to accomplish the tasks.

The [yearly] meeting may establish or lay down committees according to the need for the conduct of particular functions of the meeting....it must determine and approve a statement of its purpose and function and provide adequate funding.



“The Friends World Committee for Consultation (FWCC) fosters fellowship among all the branches of the Religious Society of Friends. In the Americas, the Quaker community extends from the Arctic to the Andes, spanning a rich diversity of regional cultures, beliefs and styles of worship.”

Friends World Committee for Consultation/Comite Mundial de Consulta de los Amigos is one of the regions of the worldwide FWCC. The Section of the Americas includes Friends Meetings and Churches throughout the hemisphere.

I was privileged to attend around 10 annual Section Meetings and 3 or 4 Triannual World Meetings between 1991 and 2007. Most of the member Meetings and Churches are the regional Yearly Meetings/Churches—our South Central YM is one of 56 YMs and groups that belong to FWCC worldwide.

As a participant in FWCC meetings, I have had many experiences with Friends which have allowed me to better understand the wide variety of Friends groups and how they express themselves, worship, and are organized. One of my favorite parts is the translation, especially during open

worship, where the Friend who gives ministry is often translated into one or more languages, and each seems a message itself.

Several years ago, FWCC initiated World Quaker Day, and this year there is a list of worship activities that can be joined by Zoom on the website (under “Events”)—we are invited to join Friends throughout the world, using Zoom. Sign up on the FWCC site or at www.worldquakerday.org

Discernment based on the charts above

Jim asked us to examine the four categories in list one to see what parts might be combined and what might we let go. Many were combined (but that is not reflected in list one); none were let go. The central concern, Joni reminded us, is listed as number one in Pastoral: maintain deep Meetings for Worship. Everything else flows from this. How to move forward? Trust in each other.

Gary commented that he has joined this same conversation many times in the last 20 years. He agreed that our primary purpose is restorative worship to energize us and give us guidance as we move into the world. We make medicine for each other that is tangible. Dale said our vision leads us to our priorities, as in any organization.

Val referred to the Biblical story of Mary, who sat at Jesus' feet to hear him preach, while Martha was in the kitchen preparing a meal for the gathering. These are two sides that can't be separated; they must work together to achieve any goal. She suggested a wall chart in the community room be set up for people to commit to certain tasks for three or six months. No one would report to anyone else.

Friends continue to explore this option. Val commented that the Mary/Martha model is repeated in George Fox, who preached and Margaret Fell, who organized those who were converted. She hoped that hearing the monthly queries could elicit more vocal ministry. James M. summed it all up: it is mysticism – a barn will not fall down as long as cows are in it. Find the wall, Friends. [GH]

Any requests regarding the expenditure of these funds from a committee or individual should be routed to the Finance Committee prior to any consideration in Meeting for Business. The Finance Committee will make a determination that the request is consistent with Mark's wishes.

Friends Advocacy Team

Members of the Team met with a staff member of Senator Ted Cruz on September 12 to present their request for ending U.S. support of the Saudi war on Yemen. Team members offered personal stories to illustrate their concern for the war, and to establish relationships with the Senator's staff. The diverse group represents four S.A. congressional districts, along with representatives from Central Texas and Rio Grande Valley. They will meet with local staff of Senator Cornyn on Oct. 18. More Quaker Jargon Revealed

Speaking Truth to Power was originally a Quaker principle, since taken up by many others. Telling a person in power what is your truth could bring heavy consequences, in the beginning and even now. Another symbol of integrity in which early Friends refused to do “hat honor” by removing their hats to anyone in authority. And Friends chose to “affirm” in legal proceedings, rather than to swear an oath, which implies part-time truth telling.

Meet the Meeting

Von and Dale Kearins

Von and Dale met while in graduate school: Dale at Carnegie Mellon University, Von at Duquesne University where they earned their PhD degrees. Dale earned his PhD in chemical engineering and Von in psychology, specializing in children. They lived in Pittsburgh until October of last year. Their son, daughter-in-law and two grandchildren live in San Antonio. They moved to San Antonio to be near family.

Dale spent 35 years with Westinghouse at the Science and Technology Center leading power generation and environmental technology development and commercialization. Westinghouse sold the industrial businesses and Dale has supported the DOE National Energy & Technology Laboratory since that time working with a support contractor. He continues to work with Deloitte Consulting.

Von's career included serving as Executive Director of Arsenal Family and Children's Center (AFCC) for 35 years. The 1970's were a period of great turmoil as the Pittsburgh steel industry declined. Families were without work. Von developed outreach centers to help these families as they transitioned. She taught a class in crisis intervention at the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary for 20 years – one class with Mr. Rogers of TV fame. Von continues her role as consultant in child psychology and board member with AFCC after retiring as the Executive Director of the Center and continues to serve on the Pittsburgh International Children's Theater board.

Von and Dale joined Pittsburgh Friends Meeting in 1972 after leading an interdenominational ministry in Pittsburgh. They served as clerks of the Meeting and were active in various Friends organizations. They served as co-clerks of the **2002** Friends General Conference Gathering in Johnstown, PA, with the theme Coming to Peace. Von served on the Quaker United Nations Office (QUNO) committee and continues to serve on the house committee. Von led a study on girl child soldiers in four countries for QUNO and UNICEF. She will be serving on the QUNO 75th anniversary (2023) AFSC Committee. Von spent time at Woodbrooke (Quaker study center in the UK) as a Friend in Residence. Von served on the board of Earlham School of Religion. They have been active with FCNL. They look forward to being part of the San Antonio Friends Meeting.

Quaker Principles

George Fox and early Friends rejected the Church of England as corrupt and elitist. They sought to return to original teachings of Jesus. Instead of a Pope or king as authority, they placed the individual at the center of authority. They gathered to share their “openings” [leadings from the Spirit], to support each other, and to build a faith community. Today, Friends continue to be seekers after Truth as we worship in silence, with messages sharing what we have discovered in the silence.

Our guiding principle from Fox is “that of God in each of us.” But what is the *that*? Quakers believe it is the spark of Divine power and call it *the Light*. It is the Light that shines within us, illuminating our strengths and the weaknesses, When we follow this self-examination diligently, we can experience its healing power.

“The Light is something of God, not something that belongs to the individual. It enlightens all people—allowing them, in a spiritual sense, to see clearly. And because it is ‘of God’ and not God, the Inward Light is just those few beams of an infinitely larger ‘Outward Light’ that happens to strike their hearts and illuminate their consciences. Everyone shares in that same Outward Light, but it is incomplete within any particular person.”

The United States has tested over 1,000 nuclear bombs on its own soil. The U.S. government detonated the world's first nuclear bomb above-ground in New Mexico with civilians living less than 12 miles away. Winds spread radioactive fallout to local "downwinder" populations, increasing infant mortality and cancer rates.

Recognizing this harm to civilians, uranium miners, and atomic veterans, Congress passed the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act (RECA) in 1990 with strong bipartisan support. Unfortunately, downwinders in highly irradiated places like Idaho, Montana, Colorado, New Mexico, and Guam have never been able to apply for RECA. If enacted, the RECA Amendments of 2021 (H.R. 5338) would extend RECA for 19 years and add eligibility for additional populations harmed by nuclear weapons activities.

For people with radiation-related cancers, access to this compensation can make the difference in getting the medical care they need. Urge your representative to support H.R. 5338! Contact your elected officials [here](#).
