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Exploring Quaker Roots

The forum June 25 returned to Margaret Fell: "We are all thieves..." Worship sharing became wideranging and deep. Friends shared personal experiences of breakthroughs in their spiritual journeys. While we never actually got to the Penington quote, we circled round its suggestions of how to respond when we face reality.

Friends wished to continue this exploration of the foundations of Quaker faith and how we live it day by day, in the third scheduled session, July 23, and beyond. To enhance our search, Gary introduced quotes from Meister Eckhart, found below. - Direct quotes by Meister Eckhart in bold; Commentary from John Caputo, <u>The Mystical Element in Heidegger's Thought</u>
- Where God is, there is the soul; where the soul is, there is God. God is nearer to the soul than it is to itself.
- The Word which God speaks in the soul is "hidden" and easily overlooked. To hear what is spoken in silence, one must be silent oneself.
